## Tour Aroha Memory Care Nov. 21



#### **VETERANS DAY TRIBUTE**

Each year in November, we as Americans pause from work, school, and other activities to honor the service of our nation's veterans. Serving this great nation and protecting our freedoms is a calling that requires perseverance and sacrifice like no other, and it is fitting that we take this day to recognize the men and women in uniform, both past and present.

This year is no exception. On Tuesday, November 11, we will gather at 10 a.m. (or earlier for coffee and donuts). In past years, we have featured presentations by a Guard from the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a talk by retired Air Force General Howell Estes, and, last year, a retired USAF physician who deployed twice to Iraq. This year, our program will feature Vets Club member and current Chair, John De Groot.

Army Specialist De Groot deployed to Vietnam in late 1962. Although he was trained as a personnel specialist, he never served in that role. Instead, he volunteered to be a door gunner with the first combatant helicopter company in Vietnam. As the U.S. effort in Southeast Asia expanded, he and his unit developed invaluable combat support experience.

Along with sharing his early experiences in the war, John will also speak about his recent Honor Flight participation. The *Press Democrat* even featured a photo of him being welcomed home.

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# Members May Now Opt-In to Electronic Voting

Oakmont members now have the option to vote electronically starting with the 2026 OVA Board of Directors election. To participate, members must opt in by completing and returning the Electronic Voting Consent Form,

which will be mailed to every Oakmont household, available at the OVA office, and posted on the OVA website at oakmontvillage.com/electronicvoting. The attached QR code will lead you to the online consent form.

The OVA office must receive the opt-in form by January 5, 2026 for it apply to the April 2026 election. Members need to opt in only once to be eligible to vote electronically in future elections. Forms received after this date will not apply to the upcoming election but will remain valid for future elections.

Electronic voting will be conducted through Pro Elections, OVA's Inspector of Elections, using a secure, third-party system in full compliance with California Civil Code. This ensures ballots are safe, private, and properly managed.

Electronic voting offers several benefits, including the convenience of ballots delivered directly to your inbox, the security of a trusted system, and the timely delivery of election materials without the risk of postal delays.

Participation in electronic voting is voluntary. Members who do not return the opt-in form will continue to receive a traditional paper ballot by mail. Paper ballots remain available for anyone who prefers them. If you would prefer to continue voting by paper ballot, you do not need to do anything.

Consent forms can be filled out online at oakmontvillage.com/electronicvoting, or they may be printed and filled out, then returned by mail or dropped off at the OVA office (Oakmont Village Association, 6637 Oakmont Drive, Santa Rosa, CA 95409), or emailed to electronicvoting@oakmontvillage.com. Forms will be available at the OVA office.

care delivery aimed at improving quality of life and a vision that sets a "higher standard for excellence."

Aroha's founder, Raj Kalra MD, said optimal memory care uses an integrated approach that brings together evidence-based medicine, dentistry, design, technology, and compassionate care to create an environment that supports healthy aging.

Dr. Kalra points to recent research showing that lifestyle medicine, which focuses on preventing and managing disease through nutrition, movement, stress reduction, and meaningful social connection, can help reverse mild cognitive impairment and stabilize other forms of dementia, offering hope and a better quality of life for those living with memory loss.

Aroha is the result of nearly a year of reconstruction at the Oakmont Drive building that once housed the OVA administrative offices and dental and medical practices. Dr. Kalra said Oakmont was a natural choice for Aroha. "Oakmont's community values—connection, wellness and lifelong learning—align perfectly with our philosophy. By coming to Oakmont, we're helping residents and families stay close to the people and places they love while offering the next level of support when memory care becomes part of the journey."

The reimagined space now features 22 private suites, each with its own bath, along with shared areas for indoor and outdoor dining, activities, entertainment, a salon, and clinical care. Dr. Nisha Kalra—Dr. Raj Kalra's wife and co-founder—will provide onsite oral care services focused on optimizing oral hygiene, preventing inflammation, and supporting improved nutrition for residents.

Natural light, garden views, and biophilic connections have also been incorporated to reduce anxiety and promote calm. Dr. Kalra also said the functional layout of the building further enhances continence care, mobility, and autonomy. "It's a space that restores confidence, fosters connection, and brings back a true sense of home."

Aroha will be on the leading edge of adopting advanced technologies. The community will be first in the nation to use SafelyYou Halo, an AI-based, 24/7 monitoring system that provides fall detection, prevention and nurse call. Another tool called PalCare is for wander management, allowing care teams to respond quickly, track patterns, and deliver personalized care.

"These systems are transformative for memory care, and we're going to be combining technology monitoring systems with real-time analytics to improve resident safety and support staff efficiency," he said. "These tools don't replace the human touch—they empower it—helping our caregivers focus on connection, comfort, and dignity while giving families greater peace of mind."

Juliet Holt Klinger, a gerontologist, has joined the Aroha team to oversee the development of outcome-based programming. "It's a model that leads to measurable results," Dr. Kalra said. "Her work ensures that every resident's experience at Aroha is guided by evidence, supported by data, and grounded in empathy."

Aroha Memory Care is expected to open by the end of the year. Suites are still available. To learn more, visit arohamemorycare.com.

So at 6:30 we had about 60 people milling around outside the East Rec. and another six or seven people inside in the gloom setting up for the event. By the time I arrived at the Berger a few minutes after 7 p.m., the lights and AV were on and working, the tables set up with chairs, and people were arranging the food and Bingo cards and drinks.

Our event was rescued! All thanks to the responsiveness, flexibility and competence of the OVA Staff. Please accept this note as a huge thank-you. At yesterday's Democratic Alliance Board meeting, we earmarked a good chunk of the proceeds from the event to the OVA staff Appreciation Fund.



#### SLOT-CARS UPDATE—NOVEMBER

All OVA residents with a proximity card are considered members of the Slot-Car Club—no membership fees required. Family members are welcome to participate in club events; all attendees are simply asked to sign the event register.

The club will host three days of racing at the Sugarloaf facility on December 27, 28 and 29, featuring two tracks and 18 Carrera digital 1/32-scale GT cars with 12 hand controllers available for use. Participants may bring their own compatible cars and controllers but should indicate this on the signup sheet (see below).

The smaller track will be designated for younger children and beginners. It includes crash zones to make learning more forgiving. Drivers accelerate by pressing down with their thumb and brake by lifting up before sharp turns. With seven different types of corners—some fast, some slow—practice is key to mastering the course.

The larger track will host 10-minute races each hour, with practice sessions in between. Races will include a simulated fuel mode, requiring cars to enter the pit every 15 laps or so for refueling to maintain top speed. If enough participants sign up, drivers will rotate so everyone has the chance to compete in at least one race per hour.

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

# The Wildland-Urban Interface in Oakmont Village

This is Part 1 about how the City of Santa Rosa and the state of California have designated areas within Oakmont Village as being vulnerable to wildfires. It is important to know these designations for your property because each imposes a different set of regulations pertaining to defensible space and other safeguards against wildfires.

In 2009, the City of Santa Rosa designated about half of Oakmont Village to be in a Wildland-Urban Interface, or WUI that rhymes with "chewy" (see map). A WUI is considered to have a significant vulnerability to wildfires.

Santa Rosa's City Code Chapter 9-32 on Hazardous Vegetation and Fuels Management requires property owners within the WUI to maintain defensible space. As stated in the chapter's purpose and intent: "Benefits from defensible space and fuels mitigation include: prevent loss of lives, reduce fire suppression costs, reduce private property losses and protect natural resources from devastating wildfire."

A set of frequently asked questions about WUI vegetation management is available at www.srcity. org/faq.aspx?qid=1142. One of the questions involves inspections, which the Santa Rosa Fire Department plans to conduct in the Oakmont Village WUI in 2026 to educate residents about complying with the city's defensible space requirements.

New construction on properties within a WUI must also comply with California Building Code Chapter 7A on "Materials and Construction Methods for Exterior Wildfire Exposure." Anyone wishing



to protect an existing home against the threat of wildfires, potentially as part of a "facelift" or remodel, will find these guidelines quite useful.

More information about WUIs is available at www.srcity.org/596/Wildland-Urban-Interface. More information about preparing for a wildfire is available at oakmontvillage.com/firewise-resource-center, where you can also request a Firewise Defensible Space and Home Hardening Assessment of your home.

The Santa Rosa Fire Department is in the process of updating the city's WUI map, so there may be some changes that affect Oakmont Village. One of the changes will involve the state's updated Fire Hazard Severity Zone designations, which will be covered in an upcoming edition of the *Oakmont News*.



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

# Oakmont Parkinson's Support Group

#### ACTIVITIES INCLUDE SPEAKERS, EXER-CISE CLASS AND PING PONG!

The Oakmont Parkinson's Support Group meets the first Friday of every month, 10–11:30 a.m., West Recreation, upper meeting room. Most meetings include a knowledgeable speaker with expertise in Parkinson's or aging and a round robin for sharing how members are doing and anything they have experienced or learned recently about living with Parkinson's Disease (PD). The meetings welcome people with Parkinson's and their family and friends. The focus is continuing to live well despite the disease.

Support group members exercise together every Tuesday, 9:30–10:30 a.m., East Recreation Center. The class is taught by PD-Connect, a nonprofit based in Sonoma and Marin Counties. PD-Connect focuses on living well despite PD and using exercise as medicine to delay the disease.

Research has shown this is possible. PD-Connect says that "exercise is the medicine but not all exercise is created equal," which is the value of exercising with an experienced PD-Connect physical therapist. The exercise class focuses on challenging balance, agility, strength, coordination, and aerobics. Moderate to high intensity exercise is shown to help slow the progression of the disease. People with other conditions or limitations are welcome.

In addition, members of the support group formed the Oakmont Ping-Pong Parkinson Club. The club plays ping-pong twice a week at West Rec. Ping-Pong improves PD symptoms and may delay the disease. Members of the club have experienced considerable improvements in how they are feeling and they are having a blast.

#### STAY SAFE DURING WILDFIRE SEASON: **ENCOURAGE FAMILY** TO USE WATCH DUTY

As we in Oakmont know all too well, living in Sonoma County means living with the reality of wildfire threats. In recent years, our community has faced repeated evacuations, rapidly changing conditions, and the daunting task of staying informed in the midst of emergencies. For many older adults, managing instant updates and making quick evacuation decisions can be stressful and overwhelming.

One simple step can make a big difference: ask your family members who live outside the area to download and subscribe to the Watch Duty app. This free app is staffed by trained citizen reporters and provides real-time wildfire updates, including fire size, location, and evacuation notices. Many Oakmont residents already use it, but having family on the app as well creates an important layer of support.

Here's how it helps:

- Family members who follow local fire reports on Watch Duty can monitor threats to Oakmont from
- They can help interpret which official updates are most urgent.
- They can call or text to remind residents if an evacuation order or warning is issued—even if those residents haven't seen the notice right away.
- They provide peace of mind, knowing that loved ones are engaged and watching over our safety.

Evacuations often have to happen quickly, and stress can cloud judgment. With trusted family members monitoring events in real time, Oakmont residents gain an extra level of reassurance and guidance when every minute counts.

Please consider asking your children, grandchildren, siblings, or close friends outside Sonoma County to download Watch Duty. It takes just a few minutes to install on either iPhone or Android devices, and it is completely free to use.

By working together and empowering our families to stay informed, we can make Oakmont a safer community during wildfire season.
